Trio hunt funds after breezing into world champs

QUALIFYING for the world OK dinghy championships proved plain sailing for Steve McDowell, but getting to the Denmark regatta will be anything but easy.

The 23-year-old Wellington sales manager led a Worser Bay Boating Club trifecta at last week's national championships in Napier, with Karl Purdie second and 2002 world champion Greg Wilcox third.

Now the trio are on the hunt for \$6000 apiece to fund a competitive campaign ahead of the world championships in July.

McDowell is confident he can better his ninth place at last year's worlds in England providing he can attract a sponsor. "We all have a few design things we want to work on to try and make us go that little bit faster and hopefully we can have another world championship at the end of it," McDowell said.

"We expect conditions in Denmark to be quite similar to Napier so we'll go there with confidence we'll be on the pace."

With four wins from eight starts, Mc-Dowell wrapped up his first national title without having to start the final two races of the national championship.

The regatta, at the same venue where Wilcox was crowned world champion three years ago, also doubled as a selection trial and the annual interdominion (New Zealand v Australia) championship.

New Zealand won convincingly with the first Australia finishing seventh.



More than OK at the Dinghy Worlds

The 2005 OK Dinghy Worlds were recently held in Skælskør, Denmark, approximately 150km south west of Copenhagen.

RPNYC's Greg Wilcox (2002 World Champion, 5 x National Champion) and Steve McDowell (current NZ national and Inter-dominion Champion) participated, along with nine other kiwis.

After leaving a cold winter in Wellington we were hoping to enjoy 20+deg temperatures, clear skies and nice 12 to 18 knot conditions. Unfortunately we were wrong! Rain, cloud and 2-5knts of wind mixed in with the occasional lightning storm were the conditions that seemed to prevail for most of the event!

The event got off to a good start with Steve narrowly missing out on winning the first race of the series. Unluckily in the second race he suffered a 40deg wind shift while coming second half way through the race, and dropped back to seventeenth.

Greg started his series a little slower but stormed back into the tricky conditions of the second race to take the bullet.

Conditions were much the same for the rest of the regatta, generally light with large shifts and even larger tides. In these tough conditions Greg really showed his experience, winning three races and only finishing outside the top 10 three times.

Unfortunately Steve's results were not quite as good but no doubt there were a lot of lessons learnt in the extremely tough conditions!

The 2005 Worlds were won by Nick Graig from England. Nick sailed a superbly consistent series, with his worst race being a fifth, and definitely deserved his win.

Of the New Zealand sailors Grea finished up 3rd and Steve 8th

The 2006 Worlds are being held in Newcastle Australia during February. Both Greg and Steve will be attending, together with a few more RPNYC members, so hopes are high for some more top placings.



Volvo count down

The Volvo Ocean Race will start in Spain in less than two months.

Originally the Whitbread Round the World Race, the Volvo starts in Vigo, Spain on 12 November 2005 and finishes in Gothenburg in July 2006. It has taken place every four years since its inception in 1973.

The fleet will cover four continents, stopping in the ports of Cape Town, Melbourne, Wellington, Rio, Baltimore, New York, Portsmouth, Rotterdam and Gothenburg.

Seven boats have entered and we continue here our regular updates of the progress of two of them, ABN AMRO and Movistar.

Movistar makes final preparations by Stu Bannatyne, Movistar

The Movistar campaign is now moving into the final stages of preparation. At the end of August we completed the final refit and relaunched the boat with a new mast and new keel bulb. Heavier bulb of course than the previous one for even more righting moment!

Fine tuning of deck layout and interior systems was also completed including installation of new hydraulic rams for the canting keel system. We have made a significant weight saving with these (almost half of previous version) and other systems so all in all we are very happy with the improvements made.

The beginning of August saw us compete in our first race. We sailed the boat to England and raced the Rolex Fastnet Race from Cowes, around the rock and back to Plymouth. Normally a race that takes just over two days, we were plagued with very light winds and took almost four days to finish! My only Fastnet slower was in a Mumm 36 10 years ago!

It was however a great opportunity for us to test our light air sails and sailing modes as well as put the crew through some racing situations such as the crowded start, mark roundings and countless sail changes trying to stay in phase with the breeze.

We crossed the finish line early in the morning and stopped in Plymouth only long enough to change a few sails and have a couple of burgers before setting off for the sail back to Spain. We had plenty of wind

out of 14 starters.

Manning's win also earned him valuable points towards the Elliot 5.9 Travellers Series, where he is now tied with Horne for first place. This means the series title will come down to next month's final race in the five regatta series.

Tony Thompson on The Tease made the most of his local knowledge winning the Noelex 25 class from John Foote on Gasparcho.



INCLEMENT weather is expected to make for exciting racing during this weekend's annual Rotorua Ice Breaker Regatta.

The two-day event has attracted 40 yachts as far away as Kerikeri and Christchurch, but predicted showers and strong westerlies turning south west tomorrow morning may interfere with the opening five races to be held on Lake Rotorua.

The event, hosted by the Bay of Plenty Trailer Yacht Squadron, incorporates the three classes of Elliot 5.9, OK Dinghy's and Noelex 25's. The Elliot 5.9 race doubles as race four of the five regatta Travellers Series, which is currently led by Cameron Horne on Slam Dunk. However, all sailors will compete for the Pig and Whistle Trophy. Top performances are expected to come from former world A-Class Cata-

maran champion Simon Manning who will take to the water on Voodoo and previous national champions in the form of Picton's Sam Edwards on Proformance, Whangerei's Dave Cochrane on Zoot Allures and Robin Ward on Hobs the Butcher. Two local yachts will take part — Sub 60 skippered by Chris McIndoe and Tight Fit skippered by Tony Poolman.

Ten entries are expected to contest the OK Dinghy class including 2004 national champion Russell Wood and 2005 champion and Inter-Dominion Champion Steve McDowell.

A large contingent of local entries make up the Noelex 25 class including skippers Tony Thompson, John Foote, Garth Wilson and Adrian McHardy.

The Appletons Rum sponsored regatta begins at 10.30am tomorrow morning with five races and concludes on Sunday at 10am with three races.

Lake Rotorua Regatta 8/9 Oct 2005

Given the forecast, it was surprising that anybody turned up at all. Friday evening saw dogs being blown off chains and road signs being blown into road trailers, and the thought of getting into an OK and going sailing was the last thing on most peoples' minds. Even so, six hardy OK Dinghy sailors turned up to battle the elements (along with fleets of Nolex 25s and Elliot 5.9s). Two more OK sailors arrived at the venue and didn't sail. One didn't even bring a boat! A third actually tried to cut off his leg with a grinder so that he had a good excuse not to go sailing.

The organizing committee from the Bay of Plenty Trailer Sailor Association managed to get 4 races in on the Saturday. A thirty five know squall in the second race took out Steve McDowell from Worser Bay and sent him to the beach for repairs where he stayed while Mark Perrow from Wakatere won the next two races. Steve appeared for the last race of the day and became the only finisher as the wind increased to over 40 knots, the rest of the fleet seeking safety on the beach.

More moderate winds of 15-20 knots on the Sunday saw the two races shared between Steve and Mark. Steve's DNS took him out of contention for the overall honours and so Mark Perrow becomes the first InterGalactic Rotovegas Champion. Hopefully next year we will have more sailors and better weather.

Hopes are high for New Zealand success at the 2005 OK Dinghy World Championship to be held in Denmark later in the year. The class recently held their National and Inter-dominion Championships in the waters of Hawke Bay, superbly hosted by the Napier Sailing Club, and their dominance of the visiting Australians was clear to be seen. The event also doubled as the selection event for the Worlds and so competition within the NZ fleet was intense. At last years Worlds, held at Parkstone, England, the NZ team finished with 9 competitors in the top 20, a feat recognized by the class in general and not seen since the domination of the Swedes in the mid 80s.

Six Australians made the trip to Napier, and were joined by 27 New Zealanders and a German. The list of competitors was quite impressive. On the Kiwi team were three former National Champions, two Inter-dominion Champions and the 2002 World Champion Greg Wilcox. Andre Blasse from Black Rock YC, Melbourne, three times Inter-dominion Champion and multiple winner of the Australian Nationals headed the Aussie team.

The conditions were generally light to moderate and fairly steady. Ten races were sailed over 4 days, each one about 70 minutes in length.

Fortunately, I can report that, of the ten races sailed, New Zealanders won every race. The closest to winning a race that an Australian got was a second place. As expected that was Andre Blasse. Mark Perrow, from Wakatere Boating Club, Auckland won the first race. Fellow Wakatere member Alistair Deaves won race 3. Generally though the racing was dominated by sailors from the Worser Bay Boating Club in Wellington. Joe Porebski won race 2. Karl Purdie race 7, Greg Wilcox race 9 and Steve McDowell, the man of the hour, won races 4,5,6 and 8. The Napier local hero, Adrian Mannering won the last race.

Overall it was McDowell who won the regatta with a 14-point lead over the second placed Karl Purdie. Greg Wilcox in third place completed the Worser Bay domination. The highest place Australian was Blasse in fifth.

And so now thoughts turn to the Worlds in July. With the top five from the Nationals all attending, along with six others, the team intends to improve on last years performance.

They now need to organize a container to take the boats to Denmark and are currently looking for sponsorship to assist with the finances.

Turangi International Open, 19,20 November 2005

Sixteen sailors made the trip to Turangi this past weekend to compete in one of the longest running regattas of recent times. This was the fourth event of the OK Dinghy Summer Series, run by the Turangi Yacht Club.

Saturday saw the competitors on the beach for the first hour while the breeze built to 5-8 knots. The sun was out and in the 22+ deg temperatures, memories of the snow and what seemed like -20deg temperatures of last year quickly faded.

The regatta got off to a great start with five races been held in the first day. The racing was extremely close with almost every boat in the fleet having lead at some stage during the racing. Finishes were even closer with several positions being scored as ties, The race management team did a superb job separating the finishers which was no doubt a challenge when you have the entire fleet finishing within 15 seconds of each other!

The top performance of the day was Alistair Deaves who managed to sail consistently in the tricky conditions winning three of the races while the rest of fleet was up and down like yo-yo's. Other good performances were shown by David Hoogenboom who won race two and Matt McDowell who won race five.

Too much rum during the evening resulted in most of the sailors sleeping through their 3.30 alarms, and so missing another All Black win over the English.

Sunday saw an increasing breeze which peaked at about 18 knots, 3 races were sailed with Greg Wilcox wining the first and last race and Steve McDowell wining the second race of the day. Deaves again sailed consistently with a third, second, and seventh to take out the International Turangi Open for 2005 by a comfortable margin. Second, third and fourth overall went to Greg Wilcox, Steve McDowell and Karl Purdie respectively all from Wellington.

The results over the weekend have seen a tightening in the 2005 New Zealand ranking list after four regattas, Steve McDowell now has a two point lead over Mark Perrow but are being chased hard by Alistair Deaves and Greg Wilcox.

While the top five spots are held by Wellington and Auckland sailors, they will be no doubt be keeping their eyes on team Napier who have a mix of youth in Darren Hunt, and experience in Trent Pryce and Adrian Mannering. The Napier boys will be looking at a strong finish to the end of the series, and, with any one of them capable of an upset victory, the series is still alive.

While the top five have a jump over the rest of the top ten the upcoming nationals count for double points, add a further two more regattas as well as a drop into the equation and no doubt a few sailors will have their calculators out!

The next regatta is the New Plymouth Big Wave Classic in two weeks time. Hopefully we will see more of the enormous waves that we experienced last year and that the west coast is famous for!

Worser Bay Hurricane Classic. 5/6 November 2005

The Worser Bay Hurricane Classic was the third regatta in the OK Dinghy Summer series and it would be fair to say that the wind lived up to its reputation! Or as one of the competitors put it; "it just blew steaming monkey nuts".

Saturday saw the wind come from the north and Sunday from the south. Competitors were assured by the locals that this was an "easing breeze" however in Wellington double-speak the phrase "easing breeze" really means that the wind will eventually ease off, but not until it has increased to such a level that the aero-dynamics of the OK rig completely break down, several boats are broken and the whole fleet is battered and worn and sitting in the clubhouse having a few beers. Only then will the wind "ease" having itself a well earned rest to prepare itself for more "easing" on the next day!

Three hardy sailors from Wakatere in Auckland joined four sailors from Napier and a seven locals on the start line for the first race in an "easing" 35 knot northerly. Karl Purdie showed good skill leading around the whole course, steadfastly refusing to capsize on the high speed down wind legs, with Adrian Mannering from Napier some way back in second place.

Only 7 boats ventured out for the second race of the day in a still "easing" 35 knot breeze. Greg Wilcox launched just 4 minutes before the start after a late decision to hit the water, and after possibly playing some head games with the other sailors watching the carnage from the safety of the club. The race itself was a battle between local Steve McDowell and Wakatere sailor Mark Perrow. Places kept changing until Perrow capsized at the last gybe, handing the race to McDowell. Worser Bay veteran Joe Porebski came home in second.

After an evening of fireworks and beer, Sunday morning actually looked quite good. But sure enough the wind was doing some more "easing" by the time the fleet got to the start line. Karl Purdie again showed a clean pair of heels in the first race, chased by McDowell. By race two the wind was over 30 knots again. The off wind sailing in the flatter water of the southerly was just fantastic. Unfortunately, 30 knot self tacking wind shifts at the top of the beat caused a few headaches. McDowell won this race after passing the leaders down the run and holding on to the finish with Purdie second.

With Purdie and McDowell counting a DNS and DNF respectively, the race for overall honours was between Perrow and Wilcox. Wilcox and Porebski swam at the wing mark and pulled out of the race. Perrow then only had to finish to win overall, achieving his best result of the regatta as he did so; a second place behind triple race winner Purdie, who could only wonder if he should had sailed race two.

So Perrow won after consistently finishing every race, being only one of three sailors to do so; the others being Grant Pedersen and Darren Hunt.

The next regatta is the Turangi International open to be held in two weeks time.
